# A YEAR OF TRANSFORMATION AND EXPANSION

Dear Friend.

2019 was a historic and transformative year for cancer research. The Samuel Waxman Cancer Research Foundation (SWCRF) directed more than \$2.2 million dollars of donor-raised funds to high-impact and collaborative research and launched two innovative research programs. We partnered with Wiley to inaugurate a first-ever peer-review journal, and we made progress in establishing an international research center. The journal and center will drive much-needed science and thought leadership around aging and cancer.

The discoveries reported by the SWCRF-funded scientists at our annual Scientific Review reinforced to us that our approach—funding novel ideas and scientists willing to collaborate with others outside of their labs—worked.

Their research addressed 14 types of cancer and found new pathways for developing more targeted and effective treatments. Our relentless focus on why cancer starts in the first place leverages our research dollars to impact many types of cancers.

We take collaboration seriously. That is why we partnered with The Alan B. Slifka Foundation and Israel Cancer Research Fund to establish the Max Ritvo, Alan Slifka and Desiree Dato Award for Fusion-Oncoprotein Cancers and Metastasis program. This program pairs a physician-scientist in the United States with a scientist in Israel to tackle a deadly form of pediatric cancer and the leading cause of cancer death: metastasis. We were delighted at the interest this international collaborative program generated among the research community.

None of these achievements would have been possible without supporters like you. Together, we truly are making breakthroughs to tackle the world's most prolific and deadly diseases. Thank you.

# **DECEMBER 10**



Emmanuelle Passegué, Ph.D., a SWCRF-Funded scientist was honored with the annual William Dameshek Prize bestowed by the American Society of Hematology (ASH). Dr. Passegué, who directs the Stem Cell Initiative at Columbia University Herbert Irving Comprehensive Cancer Center, received her first grant from the SWCRF in 2019 as one of 7 grantees selected for the foundation's \$1.4 million "Innovation Grant" program. She is studying autophagy and hematopoietic stem cell function in aging and leukemia. The prize recognizes her contributions to advancing our understanding of the biology of blood-forming stem cells, focusing on changes that happen to stem cells in the contexts of myeloid malignancies and aging. # IN HISTORIC MILESTONE FOR THE SWCRF, 53 SCIENTISTS FUNDED

The Samuel Waxman Cancer Research Foundation (SWCRF) reached a historic milestone this year after funding 53 scientists, the most ever funded at any given time.


A banner year of fundraising helped to buoy the SWCRF research programs including the launch of the Gary Gladstein Family Bladder Cancer Research Program and the Max Ritvo, Alan Slifka and Desiree Dato Award for Fusion-Oncoprotein Cancers and Metastasis research program in collaboration with The Alan B. Slifka Foundation and the Israel Cancer Research Fund.

The SWCRF also completed its first year of the two-year Partnership for Aging and Cancer Research program in collaboration with the National Cancer Institute and National Institute on Aging.

These programs added 21 more funded scientists to the nearly 30 funded within the SWCRF Institute Without Walls. This year, the SWCRF directed more than \$2,200,000 in donor-supported funds to its research programs.



# THE SWCRF \$32 MILLION FIVE-YEAR CAMPAIGN OFF TO GOOD START

The Collaborating for a Cure Campaign—the Foundation's first in 40 years—was launched in 2018. This five-year, \$32 million campaign provides the resources to sustain the level of excellence, integrity, and innovation that are the hallmark of SWCRF's approach to funding cancer research, as well as secures the SWCRF's future as a financially sustainable, durable institution.

Since the launch of the Campaign's quiet phase, SWCRF has raised just under \$8.4 million in contributions and pledges from a wide range of donors both on and outside of the board of directors.

Gifts to the Campaign support its four "buckets," including the Partnership for Aging and Cancer Research, the Institute Without Walls Programs, General Operations, and Endowment.

Campaign leadership includes the Campaign and Development Committee, comprised of board members Michael Nierenberg (Co-Chair), Ari Zagdanski (Co-Chair), James Frankel, Lewis Rubin, Joseph Steffa, Howard Kurz, and Spencer Waxman, as well as Founder and CEO Samuel Waxman, Executive Director William Sullivan and Jayme Koszyn of Koszyn & Company. They have all worked tirelessly to execute the multiple activities of the Campaign, and to lead us into the public phase, which will unfold in 2021.

Campaign milestones have included three unprecedented challenge gifts, beginning with Musa Mayer's commitment of \$1 million, Michael Nierenberg's challenge during the 2019 gala, leading to more than \$1 million in donations, and the Gladstein Family/Marsha Lilien Gladstein Foundation's pledge to SWCRF of \$1,000,000 in support of bladder cancer research.

# A NEW RESEARCH COLLABORATION PAIRS SCIENTISTS IN ISRAEL AND THE UNITED STATES

In 2019, the SWCRF partnered with The Alan B. Slifka Foundation (ABSF) and the Israel Cancer Research Fund (ICRF) to establish the Max Ritvo, Alan Slifka and Desiree Dato Award for Fusion-Oncoprotein Cancers and Metastasis. The partnership allocated \$500,000 for funding two pairs of scientists over two years.

Drs. Lawlor and Yarden will explore ways to overcome abnormal proteins such as in Ewing sarcoma. This rare cancer primarily affects children and young adults. The program was named in memory of Max Ritvo, a talented young man who died in 2016 at age 25 from Ewing sarcoma.

Drs. Merad and Amit will study how to alter the immune system to prevent cancer from spreading throughout the body, known as metastasis.

# GLADSTEIN FAMILY BLADDER CANCER RESEARCH PROGRAM

A longtime member of the SWCRF Board of Directors, Gary Gladstein and his family awarded the SWCRF \$1 million towards the 5-year campaign for advancing research for bladder cancer. The award was announced at the 2019 Collaborating for a Cure Gala.

Bladder cancer is the fourth most common cancer in men and typically occurs in adults of either gender who are age 55 and over.

Early in 2020, the SWCRF issued an RFP for two research collaborations each at \$200,000 over two years. After receiving more than three dozen proposal submissions, the SWCRF scientific leadership selected two scientists as principal investigators (PI).

Dr. Beachy and his lab at Stanford University School of Medicine will explore reactivating differentiation signals to prevent invasive bladder cancer from occurring.

Dr. Rosenberg and his colleagues at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center will study how bladder cancer forms through an innovative approach to using animal models that replicate epigenetic changes in human bladder cancer.

# THE SWCRF PARTNERS WITH WILEY FOR ITS FIRST AGING AND CANCER JOURNAL



The SWCRF reached another historic achievement in 2019 by partnering with Wiley to publish a new scientific journal titled 'Aging and Cancer.' Wiley is the world's leading publisher of scientific journals. The partnership will advance research breakthroughs and thought leadership around aging and cancer.

The journal's editorin-chief is notable research scientist

James DeGregori, Ph.D., director of molecular biology at the University of Colorado School of Medicine. Dr. DeGregori is also one of the scientists who received funding from the SWCRF research collaboration with the National Cancer Institute and National Institute on Aging. Led by Dr. DeGregori, a six-member editorial board will peer-review article submissions. The board appointments include distinguished

scientists from the United States, China, Germany, Italy, and Japan. One of the editorial board members is Ruibao Ren, Ph.D. of the Shanghai Jiao Tong University School of Medicine, an SWCRF-funded investigator and member of the SWCRF Institute Without Walls (IWW).

A four-member advisory board includes familiar names: Dr. Samuel Waxman, Ross Levine, M.D., and Margaret Goodell,

Ph. D. Drs. Levine and Goodell are currently SWCRF-funded investigators and members of the SWCRF IWW. Also appointed is Judith Campisi, Ph.D., a prominent scientist studying agerelated diseases at the Buck Institute for Research on Aging.

Wiley and the SWCRF published an editorial in March 2020. "As the newest member of the Wiley family of scientific journals, 'Aging and Cancer' will provide an important forum for new results and ideas that improve our understanding for how old age influences many different facets of cancer, from incidence, to its development and pathology, to treatment outcomes," wrote James DeGregori, Ph.D.

# A KEY METRIC FOR MEASURING IMPACT OF RESEARCH

One key metric the SWCRF uses to measure the impact of its funded research is the "Relative Citation Ratio" (RCR), also known as "Impact Factor" (IF). The National Institute of Health established this rating to identify investigators' scientific influence by the number of times other published research cites their work.

The SWCRF reviewed its most recent 7 grantees and found they have an average RCR of 3.7, which means their work is nearly four times as likely as the average of 1.07 to be cited by other scientists. This rating places them in the top 90 percentile of scientists and underscores the highly selective process SWCRF employs to fund the top decile of scientists' cancer research.

# **2019 SCIENTIFIC REVIEW AND BREAKTHROUGHS PRESENTATION**

More than 60 attendees from five countries participated in the 2019 Annual Scientific Review held at the Leon and Norma Hess Center for Science and Medicine at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. The gathering included SWCRF-funded investigators with the SWCRF Institute Without Walls (IWW), members of the SWCRF Scientific Advisory Board, and special guests, including a delegation from China.

SWCRF-funded investigators presented research updates and research breakthroughs around solid tumors, blood malignancies, targeted therapies, and discoveries in understanding the cancer microenvironment.

New findings on the links between aging and cancer were a salient theme. The year kicked off the SWCRF research collaboration with the National Cancer Institute (NCI) and National Institute on Aging (NIA) with the selection of fourteen collaborating investigators.

A delegation of scientists and community leaders from China met with SWCRF leadership and funded scientists

to discuss the next steps in establishing a new international research center in collaboration with the SWCRF.

More than 120 attended the annual Breakthroughs presentation, including members of the SWCRF Board of Directors, donors, community members, stakeholders, and press. SWCRF-funded investigators shared research updates. Presenters were Ethan Dmitrovsky, M.D., laboratory director at the Frederick National Laboratory for Cancer

Research, Julio Aguirre-Ghiso, Ph.D., professor of hematology and medical oncology at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai, Shai Izraeli, M.D., director of the department of hematology at the Schneider Children's Medical Center in Israel, and Ross Levin, M.D., chair in leukemia research at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center.







Presenters at the 2019 Breakthroughs event included Lorraine Gudas, Ph.D., a member of the SWCRF Scientific Advisory Board, Samuel Waxman, M.D., and Shai Izraeli, M.D., a funded investigator from Israel.

Attendees of the 2019 Breakthroughs presentation filled the auditorium at the Hess Center for Science and Medicine.


# THE SWCRF SPEARHEADS THE DEVELOPMENT OF AN INTERNATIONAL RESEARCH CENTER

The SWCRF has led an international effort to advance research studying the links between aging and cancer by developing a world-class research center. The effort began with the Partnership for Aging and Cancer Research that the SWCRF established in 2018 with the National Cancer Institute and the National Institute on Aging. It has since expanded internationally with the proposed launch of a research center based in Shanghai and Hainan, China.

Age is the leading risk factor for cancer, making adults over 55 more likely to develop cancer. Historically, there has been a gap in research examining the links between age and cancer. Also, while older adults often receive cancer treatments, the treatments are often developed in young animal models. The risks or efficacy of treatments in individuals with advanced age are troubling consequences of using young animal models.

The SWCRF seeks to fill these research gaps by establishing a new center to fund and drive more age-centered cancer research. To that end, a delegation of research scientists and leaders from China attended the 2019 Scientific Review to further explore the possibility. In turn, the SWCRF sent a delegation to China in 2019. The delegation included Dr. Samuel Waxman, SWCRF Chief Mission Officer, Alan Rosmarin, M.D., members of the SWCRF Scientific Advisory Board, Steven Gore, M.D. and Hua Yu, Ph.D., and Tom Misteli, Ph.D., Director, Center for Cancer Research at the National Cancer Institute.

Like the United States and other nations, China has a large population of older adults. The demographic will continue to grow in the coming decades. Despite political tensions that exist, the country has made substantial investments in research that addresses the leading health issues for the aged.
