A YEAR OF PERSEVERANCE

Dear Friend.

To say that the past year was a challenge is an understatement. As we write, the global death toll from COVID-19 is 4.3 million deaths when this report went to press, with more than 600,000 in the U.S. alone. To put that in perspective: 600,000 Americans died from all cancers combined in 2020 alone. We are grateful to the scientists who worked tirelessly and collaboratively to develop the life-saving vaccines that are moving us toward getting us back to normal.

However, like most non-profit organizations, the pandemic had a significant impact on us. Many of our annual fundraising events had to be cancelled or retooled as virtual. Laboratories were closed for months. Despite these hurdles, the Samuel Waxman Cancer Research Foundation provided \$2 million+ in funding grants to more than 50 leading investigators across three continents. And, in a significant move forward for us institutionally, Charity Navigator awarded us with four stars this year, a testament to our fiscal strength and governance accountability.

The global pandemic has also introduced the world to the concept of "flattening the curve," which scientists contemplate about diseases like cancer too. As you know, the risk of cancer increases as we age and, with life expectancy rising, so inevitably is the global burden of cancer. Our mission is to fund the science that will lead to a flattening of this trend.

As an example, since 2008 SWCRF has directed \$600,000 to Kevan Shokat from UC San Francisco to help fund his investigations to create a compound that could block the KRAS protein, the most common gene-related driver of developing life-threatening tumor growth. Investigators had all but given up on developing such a medication until Shokat's research led to the development of the first drug to selectively target and treat KRAS mutated lung cancer. This new medication was recently approved by the FDA in May 2021. Studies show treatment results in a 50% reduction in tumor size, with remarkably low toxicity, and could be used to shrink tumors in the colon and pancreas as well.

The development of this new drug demonstrates SWCRF's commitment to ongoing funding of the brightest minds in cancer research. And one thing is for sure, we couldn't persevere this past year without the generous support of our donors and the dedication of our investigators around the world. Together, we will be at the forefront of ending this dreadful disease once and for all.



"Thanks to those who participated, SWCRF was able to fund 60 scientists, a record number for the foundation, who are among the brightest and best cancer researchers around the world."

YOUR DONATIONS AT WORK

SWCRF RESEARCHER DISCOVERS BREAKTHROUGH **TREATMENT FOR LUNG CANCER**

After more than 40 years, researchers have finally succeeded in developing medications that effectively turn off one the most common cancer-causing genetic mutations – the overactive KRAS protein. Scientists had almost given up, referring to mutant KRAS as "undruggable" or cancer's "Death Star".

However back in 2008, the SWCRF made its first* investment into the pioneering research by Kevan Shokat, PhD., a leading academic chemist at UC San Francisco investigating molecules that could attach to the mutated protein and prevent it from functioning.

Five years later, after screening thousands of molecules, Dr. Shokat released data showing the discovery of a compound that effectively targeted the mutant KRAS in cancer cells, turning it off. The findings led to the first FDA-approved medication to successfully target KRAS mutation lung cancer. Studies show the drug shrinks tumors by 50 percent, while having remarkably low toxicity. This is a transformational contribution since this new class of drugs will be used in combination with even greater effect.

"This medication is a real gamechanger," said Dr. Samuel Waxman. "And it is the perfect example of why we do what we do here at the SWCRF – fund leading scientists, encourage ongoing collaboration, and discover new, minimally toxic treatments that will save lives."

SWCRF is in the middle of a new two-year partnership with Max Ritvo, a talented young man who died in 2016 at the the Alan B. 

Bladder cancer is the currently the fourth most common cancer among men but can occur in any adult, most often in those over fifty-five. To combat this disease, SWCRF launched a new collaboration, thanks to a \$1 million grant from SWCRF Board Member Gary Gladstein and his family.

The program is currently funding a pair of investigators for an initial two-year program. Dr. Beachy and his lab at Stanford University School of Medicine is exploring methods to reactivate differentiation signals to prevent invasive bladder cancer from occurring. And Dr. Rosenberg and his colleagues at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center are examining how bladder cancer forms through an innovative approach to using animal models that replicate epigenetic changes in human bladder cancer.

The Gladstein grant will allow SWCRF to continue to fund additional bladder cancer research collaborations.


HISTORIC MILESTONE FOR THE SWCRF, 53 SCIENTISTS FUNDED

In 2019, due to a banner year of fundraising for SWCRF, the foundation announced a historic milestone—funding 53 scientists, the most ever funded at any given time.

These two-year funding grants include: the Partnership for Aging and Cancer Research Program in collaboration with the National Cancer Institute and National Institute on Aging; and the launch of the Gary Gladstein Family Bladder Cancer Research Program, and the Max Ritvo, Alan Slifka and Desiree Dato Award for Fusion-Oncoprotein Cancers and Metastasis research program in collaboration with The Alan B. Slifka Foundation and the Israel Cancer Research Fund. In total, these programs added 21 funded scientists to the SWCRF Institute Without Walls[™].

SWCRF also expanded its Women's Cancer Research Program, which includes 13 scientists dedicated to working together to discover new, more effective, treatments for breast and ovarian cancers. Overall, in its last round of grants, SWCRF allocated \$2,283,265 in donor-supported funds to its cancer research programs, with \$700,000 being awarded to its Women's Cancer Research Program.

"Without the contributions from our generous donors we would not be able to grow our team of scientists, who are working collaboratively—across institutions, expertise and countries—to investigate the abnormal gene functions that cause cancer and develop minimally toxic treatments," said Dr. Samuel Waxman, founder and chief executive officer of the SWCRF. "We are profoundly grateful for their ongoing support."


Last year, in collaboration with Wiley Publishing, SWCRF launched *Aging AND Cancer*, a new scientific journal to advance research breakthroughs and thought leadership aimed at addressing the rising incidence of cancer in aging populations and to discover better treatments.

"There are significant disparities with regards to tackling cancer in older populations, contributing to limited inclusion in clinical trials, under-funded research, and inadequate treatment," said Dr. Samuel Waxman, Founder and CEO of the Samuel Waxman Cancer Research Foundation. "Aging AND Cancer will provide an important platform to bring more attention to this significant problem and help improve health outcomes. We must understand why and how to prevent the global rising cancer incidence due to AGING."

The journal's Editor-in-Chief is notable research scientist James DeGregori, Ph.D., Deputy Director at the University of Colorado Cancer Center. Dr. DeGregori is also one of the scientists who has received funding from the SWCRF research collaboration with the National Cancer Institute and National Institute on Aging. Led by Drs. DeGregori and Shen Baiyong (of the Shanghai Jiao Tong University School of Medicine in China), the eight-member editorial board peer-reviews article submissions and determines editorial content. The board appointments include distinguished scientists from the United States, China, Germany, Italy, and Japan. One of the editorial board members is Ruibao Ren, Ph.D. of the Shanghai Jiao Tong University School of Medicine, an SWCRF-funded investigator and member of the SWCRF Institute Without Walls (IWW).

A four-member advisory board includes, Drs. Samuel Waxman, M.D., Ross Levine, M.D, and Margaret Goodell, Ph.D. Drs. Levine and Goodell are currently SWCRF-funded investigators and members of the SWCRF IWW. Also appointed is Judith Campisi, Ph.D., a prominent scientist studying age-related diseases at the Buck Institute for Research on Aging, and Seishi Ogawa, M.D./Ph.D., a leader in understanding early stages of cancer initiation as we age at Kyoto University in Japan.

"Aging AND Cancer will provide an important, and perhaps unique, forum for new results and ideas that improve our understanding for how old age influences many different facets of cancer, from incidence to its development and pathology to treatment outcomes to the challenges of living with cancer. Thus, the journal will span the aging and cancer field from basic biology to clinical and population sciences. We are very proud to partner with the SWCRF, which has a long history of supporting research into links between old age and cancer."



Dr. James DeGregori was appointed editor-in-chief of the first-ever Wiley journal on "Aging AND Cancer."

THE SWCRF FIVE-YEAR COLLABORATING FOR A CURE CAMPAIGN HELPS TO LEAD **THE WAY THROUGH A CHALLENGING 2020**

By providing the multi-year gifts crucial to sustaining the Foundation during the pandemic, the five-year *Collaborating* for a Cure Campaign was essential to both day-to-day operations and investigators' work when they returned to the laboratory bench.

During the pandemic year, this five-year blended campaign continued to provide crucial support for the high quality and innovation that characterizes SWCRF's careful approach to funding cancer research, as well as helped to solidify SWCRF's future as a financially sustainable, durable institution—despite the enormous challenges to fundraising during this period in history. During spring of 2020, the Campaign pivoted by unfolding a significant SWCRF Covid *Emergency Fund* which focused on three areas: i) the At the Bench program, a two-year fundraising initiative focused on direct costs for SWCRF investigators, emphasizing the Campaign "bucket" focused on science; ii) Planned Giving efforts; and iii) the increase in the Annual Fund required by the Foundation's new Strategic Plan. As a result, the Campaign was sustained through increases of foundation gifts, renewals and new contributions from individuals, all spurred by giving to the Fund.

Since the launch of the Campaign's quiet phase in 2018, SWCRF has raised just under \$10 million in contributions and pledges from a wide range of donors at many giving levels from both the Board and outside donors. Gifts to the Campaign support the Partnership for Aging and Cancer Research, the Institute Without Walls Programs, General Operations, and Endowment. With the pandemic pivot, the *Emergency Fund* and the related *At the Bench* program galvanized returning and new Campaign donors. We are pleased to announce that the Foundation received its first legacy pledge from Board member Gerry Joyce, as well as a non-Board bequest, officially kicking off the Endowment/ Planned Giving part of the Campaign. In addition, leadership gifts toward At the Bench—which enables researchers to scale their current work exponentially—will lead to increased giving for the work where it counts: in the laboratory.

The Campaign is skillfully helmed by the SWCRF Campaign and Development Committee which includes Board members Michael Nierenberg (Co-Chair), Ari Zagdanski (Co-Chair), James Frankel, Lewis Rubin, Joseph Steffa, Howard Kurz, and

The At the Bench program will build on Campaign milestones which have included three challenge gifts, beginning with Musa Mayer's pioneering commitment of \$1 million, Michael Nierenberg's challenge during the 2019 gala leading to more than \$1

million in total matching donations, and the Gladstein Family/ Marsha Lilien Gladstein Foundation's pledge to SWCRF in the amount of \$1,000,000 in support of bladder cancer research.

As we went to press, the Aging and Cancer initiative within the Campaign received a \$1 million contribution from longtime Foundation supporter Marc Leder.
